Cameras on. Mics off. She enters the classroom to silence. Little faces framed in black stare back. "Good morning, class!" This is not a scene out of a sci-fi movie. No, this is a scene from the eLearning classroom. With the uncertainty of the pandemic shadowing the start of the school year, Highland



Christian School offered a security some families needed: an option to keep their children at home and still receive the quality, Christian education they desired from HCS.

Whose Heart As an eLearning teacher, I have the privilege of teaching junior high history and 6th grade math. Over the internet, the students' bedrooms connect to my room in Ukraine – 5,000 miles and 8 hours apart! Who could have imagined? As Christian Reformed missionaries in Ukraine, our family also found ourselves looking for online schooling and teaching opportunities. It is a blessing for me to be able to work for Highland Christian School.

eLearning has mostly been a positive experience for me. In the beginning, I had some hard times getting into a routine with going to school online. It was difficult to understand that even though I was at home, I still needed to act like I was in

school. After I got used to my new routine, I started to really enjoy eLearning. I was still able to see my classmates on the Zoom calls, I was still learning the same things as they were in the classroom, but I was also able to work on things at my own speed. I could move quickly through things that I already understood and spend more time on things that I didn't understand yet.

Two of my teachers use Google Classroom to assign work for the week. My assignments, quizzes, tests and projects are all done through the computer. I start my day by logging in and writing down what I need to accomplish. Then I sign on to my Zoom classes for the day. My teachers use Zoom to teach us like we were physically in the classroom at school. There are only a few kids on the Zooms, which allows the teachers to spend a lot of time making sure that we understand what they are teaching. After lunch, I start on my homework and usually finish it before school would normally be done for the day. Being able to work on my assignments at my own speed allows me to spend time working on things that I am having difficulty with and still have time to enjoy things outside of school.

eLearning has allowed me to work on some interesting projects. My favorite project was for history. Each person in the class was assigned a different pharaoh to research. We each had to create a slide about our pharaoh and then had to teach the rest of the class about what we learned. My eLearning teachers have worked hard to make learning interesting and fun!

How Do We Do It? With collaboration from the classroom teachers, I am able to keep the eLearning students in step with the classroom so that they can eventually return without any discrepancies in the instructional content. I utilize a number of online tools to make learning accessible and feasible. Through a daily 30-minute Zoom session, we cover the concepts and I am able to answer students' questions. With Zoom's breakout room feature, students work in small groups and collaborate together. Students follow up with practice and demonstrate their learning in much the same way they would in the classroom. Countless online tools provide many new opportunities, but sometimes it's better to just open the textbook and learn the old-fashioned way!


I have thoroughly enjoyed getting to know the students – to the extent that a Zoom classroom affords. I love the diversity at HCS and how the students' perspectives and experiences relate to the topics we cover. The world we live in has been impacted by the pandemic, but God has been faithful to provide a way through. eLearning is one such path. Until we can be face to face in the classroom again, let's unmute the mics, turn on the webcams, and learn together.

Junior High Academic Support

"What is that bizarre contraption on the table?" Although the goal of meeting individual student needs is unchanging, the junior high academic support room may look different at different times of the day. During some class periods I am working with small groups of students, teaching grade level math or language arts to 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students. Some of those classes might also include eLearners who are zooming in for instruction, while one 7th grade math class is comprised only of eLearners. Mr. Vander Woude found a flexible, sturdy iPad clamp that allows the iPad to be front and center in front of the whiteboard so our eLearners can see instruction and participate in discussion along with in-class students. At the end of each day, a supported study hall provides another opportunity for students to plan their homework and receive help on assignments. Every day in academic support is a busy day of encouraging students to stretch themselves to use their God-given talents and abilities to glorify Him.



The Right Tools Make All The Difference

The role of digital technology in education has been growing in quantum leaps in the last twenty years. For those who have



resisted this trend, the recent shutdown of schools has issued a clarion call. Educators need to embrace the possibilities offered. Likewise, students and parents have learned to appreciate the power of technology while quarantined at home.

Digital Resources

Blackbaud (**OnCampus**) provides the backbone of our digital learning management system with a robust tool through which parents are informed about learning activities, and students access and turn in assignments as well as complete assessments. It provides much data for the office staff as well. Teacher **Nearpod** accounts allow for an engaging exchange of information. Students can respond in various ways to information from teachers from writing to drawing. **Videos** can also be set to pause and offer questions, thereby more thoroughly engaging students in the content offered.

As a Professional Learning Community (PLC), HCS is naturally concerned with the questions dealing with what if students do or don't learn what is expected of them. This is where **IXL** comes in as a valuable resource, assisting those who need additional help and further challenging those who are mastering material. Another helpful addition to this list is that most of the curriculum, including math, reading, and social studies, is accessible online. These subjects also offer the text, assignments, and assessments.

Human Resources

Probably one of the most important things the HCS Board did was to wisely hire additional staff to administer our eLearning program. Specialized staff members assigned to eLearning students provide continuity, increased teaching time and assistance with virtual students, and a welcome relief of stress to the full-time staff member administering to the actual students. Presently, HCS has eight part-time eLearning staff. Additionally, two leveled-reading teachers are assisting with reading and math, and an additional two full-time teachers have opted to either live-stream their classes or record them for later viewing by students.

We have been blessed with the digital resources available to us here. More so, we are grateful for the commendable work carried out by our most excellent eLearning staff. Their work has been a real blessing to our school.

Completing Our Journey and Leading the Way

Over the last three years, Highland Christian School has been on a journey to implement standards-based grading (SBG). This journey has been carried out gradually and carefully, as the entire staff has read books and engaged in seminars. This school year marks the completion of this journey, as grades 6-8 adopt the SBG method of evaluation.

As standards-based grading becomes more common throughout the United States, software companies are responding with development of software that accommodates this method. Over the last two years, our learning management provider, Blackbaud, has developed its answer to this request. It allows teachers to view standards, match them up with assignments, and issue report cards showing a student's learning progression in these standards.

Parents are able to look at how their students are progressing on specific standards. This provides an opportunity for parents to assist their students at home by instructing them to focus on various online resources like IXL. Presently, the Highland Christian IXL account includes math, language arts, science, social studies, and Spanish. Like the school standards, these standards match with those set by the Indiana Department of Education.

Mr. Vander Woude Represents at Blackbaud

We have witnessed a growing number of schools who have heard about SBG and have become interested in making the change to this system. Highland Christian has already been able to serve as a resource for these schools and assist them. Additionally, as the Director of Instructional Technology, Mr. Vander Woude served on a panel which was part of a webinar sponsored by the Blackbaud Corporation, which has developed an SBG grading system which we are using. This webinar offered interested schools practical information on how other schools have transitioned to SBG, and how the Blackbaud learning management system has assisted in communicating standards and grades to parents.

What is always meaningful in these webinars is the ability for interested attendees to submit questions. The five members of the panel were able to offer invaluable information about the best ways to begin this SBH journey and helpful resources for informing teachers. The Highland Christian staff is excited about where it's come on this journey and how it has been able to assist others get on the road. It hopes to continue to serve as a resource to others in the future.

subjegate these opinions and instead use evidence based practices to guide decision making during our start-of-year professional development sessions. His teaching boosted and emboldened our teachers, compelling them further on our journey into evidence based practices.

In addition to adopting Rick DuFoir's PLC framework, Highland Christian's faculty is exploring Dr. John Hattie's research on the factors that play into academic success. Dr. John Hattie, a world-wide educational leader and researcher, studied that relationship between educational factors and



academic success.

In his text, *Visible Learning*, Dr. Hattie unpacked a meta-analysis of millions of studies that scale effects on student learning. At Highland Christian, our goal is to find the most efficient and student-centered way to achieve high levels of learning for ALL of our students. Thankfully, Dr. Hattie's findings allow us to make informed decisions so we don't get "stuck by the train" as the research and methods have already been evaluated.

It is a privilege to work at a school that utilizes the best tools and professional collaboration to equip students to live a life for the Lord. By faithfully pursuing the best instructional methods, we are able to better showcase the world that God has created for each of us.

WIN/Power Hour

(Student Opportunity, Student Accountability)

This year in junior high we have incorporated into the Monday-Thursday daily schedules time to work with students in individual and small group settings by modifying the junior high schedule to include WIN time and Power Hour.

On Mondays and Wednesdays, all junior high students participate in WIN time. WIN time, or "What I Need" time, is for all students to participate in ability level groups that focus on strengthening their skills in math, reading and writing. Students are placed in ability groups based on their NWEA MAP scores. In these groups, students work on specific skills such as reading comprehension, writing summaries, algebraic functions, geometry, and more. These small groups are led by teachers, and students are mixed between grade levels when they meet. Most recently in WIN time, students have been working on identifying themes and main ideas, while strengthening their skills of comprehension, as they read nonfiction stories. Our next upcoming topic of study in WIN time will focus on mathematical computation and statistics.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays, students who need to be held accountable, participate in Power Hour. Power Hour is time for students who need to complete missing or late assignments, who need additional academic support, or who need to re-do their work. This individual work time is supervised by teachers who offer guidance and help to students as they complete their work. If students are not in Power Hour, they are participating in junior high intramurals. The junior high teachers have been noticing how Power Hour has developed into a beneficial time for our junior high students who are struggling and may need additional support beyond the normal class time.

Ultimately, both of these times allow students to have the opportunity to complete work at their level, strengthen their skills, and further develop life-long academic skills. The inclusion of both WIN time and Power Hour into the junior high schedule have been a great new addition to the junior high schedule for this school year.

Throughout the course of 2020, Highland Christian's administrative team collectively worked together to pursue partnerships with public schools, state organizations, and federal programs to support student services, school security, and COVID-related needs. Through the hard work of the Highland Christian administrative team, Development Director, and School Board, HCS was awarded:

SSSG Grant | Minutes Matter!

In an active emergency event, every minute matters. Highland Christian was awarded the Indiana Department of Homeland Security **Secured School Safety Grant** in the amount of \$32,100! We praise the LORD for this provision and thank an anonymous donor who provided the 25% match required by this grant.

With this award, we are able to improve the security of entryways and windows, enhance emergency communication, and better equip staff to act as first responders. Over fall break,

- Munster Glass replaced existing glass windows in our main office foyer and (4) gym foyer windows with laminate glass, and reinforced glass doors and windows throughout our building.
- D & G Electric installed exterior lighting in the "U" parking area, added emergency light fixtures in all hallways, and repurposed existing emergency lights to other essential areas.
- Access Master installed (3) panic buttons, giving us direct access to the Sheriff's Office in the event it is ever needed.

We are currently working with Mr. Gary Voogt (Access Master) to install an integrated, exterior PA system, and additional video surveillance and look forward to the completion of all related projects by Spring 2021.

These structural modifications complement the crisis management training and emergency response protocols we already have in place, and address the highest priorities identified in Highland Christian School's Physical Security Assessment (Summer 2019). Current Pending Applications: October 2020 - **\$207,112** FEMA Funding

As a result of these endeavors, Highland Christian was able to upgrade video surveillance, provide PPE resources to students and staff, compensate employees during pandemic closures, and hire eLearning teachers to support the greater constituency throughout COVID-19. Many thanks to Jodi Lineburg, Roberta Huitsing, and Glen DeYoung for organizing and managing many of these funding sources to better support our school family.


