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

PARENTING AND EDUCATION:

Why communication (between the two) is key to an amazing school

I have been in education now for 27 years. During that time, I have learned a lot and continue to learn something new almost every day. I have shared with the many athletic teams that I coached over the years, that you never want to get to the point where you believe you have arrived (stopped getting better; learning). If you do, then you have nowhere else to go. So, keep on learning.

One of the many things that I continue to learn is how important *communication* is. This doesn't only apply to education. This is true in life. Do you know what helps my marriage? *Communication*. Do you know what helps my parenting? *Communication*. Do you know what helps my job go smoother? *Communication*.

Which leads me to what I believe has, will, and needs to continue in order to make Highland Christian better. You guessed it. *Communication*.

Each time there is a behavioral situation at school, I have a conversation with the student(s) and if the situation calls (no pun intended) for it, I pick up the phone in order to speak to the parent along with having the child speak to them as well. Why do I do this? Because being in a relationship with you and your child means *communicating*.

Recently, I have met with quite a few students, of all ages and grade levels, in regards to hurtful words being said such as, "You're not my friend anymore!," to inappropriate language, to making fun of someone not making an athletic team, to bringing up differences in how students look, racial comments, sexual jokes, and general disrespect towards one another. Each of you already know this is the wrong type of *communication*. As hard as it is to type these situations, it probably is even harder to read them.

There are times when parents say to me that these types of occurrences shouldn't happen at a Christian school. If I am honest with you, that bothers me. Why? Because we are sinful people too, by nature. Satan doesn't like what is going on at HCS. God's word says in 1 Peter 5:8, "Be sober minded; be watchful. Your adversary, the devil, prowls around like a roaring Lion, seeking someone to devour." Satan wants to attack us. He wants to attack your kids. One of the statements that I have *communicated* with parents when handling issues such as these is that we are Highland

Christian School not Highland Perfect School. There is sin and brokenness here too. But, what sets HCS apart is how we get to address the imperfectness of when mistakes and poor choices are made (Romans 3:23-31).

When these difficult situations were coming up, I began asking the Lord to open up a time for me to *communicate*, starting with the entire junior high, to speak to these issues. Then, as only our God can do, on Friday, February 9, the Holy Spirit went to work. Our 2nd grade chapel finished at 8:47am, which is about fifteen minutes early. It was then that I knew that God was making time for me to speak to your kids. I spoke to a few of the junior high teachers and asked for the entire junior high to meet in the Commons.

What God laid on my heart for junior high was Ephesians 4:29, a verse I challenge all of you, myself included, to memorize which says, "Do not let ANY unwholesome talk (communication) come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up, according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen."

I communicated with junior high that living out this verse isn't easy but when God says, "ANY unwholesome talk"...that really covers all that has been happening recently and then some! After talking to them about the hurtful comments that have been said recently, we spent the next ten minutes having students and staff communicate something encouraging about other people in the room. It was so great to hear junior high students encouraging others where God has gifted them, hearing junior high staff members praise students who care for others, and see the faces of students light up when someone was talking kindly about them.

This is what God desires for all of us at Highland Christian. Be *encouraging to one another*. Why? Because His word says so. Hebrews 10:24,25 says, "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another - and all the more as you see the Day approaching." The truth is, the day is approaching and all of us should be striving to hear our Creator say, "Well done, good and faithful servant." Be encouraged. Strive to be encouraging to one another. This is the best way to *communicate*.

OFFICE EXPANSION/ SECURITY

Throughout Highland Christian's season of growth, proactive and strategic decisions have been made to support students and staff, provide additional spaces for learning, and advance the visible impact that Highland Christian is making for His glory.

As a result of strategic stewardship of the school board and administration.

some of the school's federal COVID-19 dollars were earmarked for special projects to help propel the school forward in future years. Some of these projects included paying for a portion of the new building, obtaining two buses, offering a \$5,000 match for new family legacy funds, and adding a School Safety Officer to Highland Christian.

As the board considered the demands placed on the admissions team, Indiana Choice Scholarship team, development activities, and other front office functions, the board hired Lagastee-Mulder to complete an office bump-out that will add two unique offices and a workroom during the summer of 2024. In addition to this newly constructed space, funds were allocated to enhance the security and flow of the front office through an office remodel. This project also includes the addition of a sick room with an attached restroom for students that become ill during the day. This project, totaling \$450,000, will be fully funded through pandemic dollars and proceeds from HCS' auction.

Scheduled for the month of June, the school is looking forward to completing this enhancement as we best serve our entire school community. Thank you for your prayers and support as we complete this project over the coming months.



ALUMNI IN FOCUS: 2 MILLION POP TABS AND COUNTING!

Recently, I had the pleasure of spending a Saturday morning with the Jeff Poortenga family. Jeff (Class of 2002) and Krystal, accompanied by their three children, reflected on the milestone that has been reached with Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) pop tabs drive through Highland Christian School.

For those unfamiliar, Jeff and Krystal's eldest daughter, Elena, was born with a rare condition called gastroschisis, which means that her intestines and some other organs were located outside of her body. This resulted in Elena needing round the clock care and for Jeff and Krystal needing a place to stay when they were with her. The family turned to RMHC.

Pop tabs are recycled courtesy of United Scrap Metal, and the funds are donated to RMHC to help support the mission to provide care for families of children with complex medical needs.

The Poortenga's shared their desire to collect pop tabs for RMHC with Highland Christian School. To incentivize pop tab donations, HCS promised the winning class a pizza party, but the donations did not stop there. In February of 2023, a letter from RMHC indicated that a whopping 53 pounds of pop tabs had been donated. Then, another letter arrived to HCS in September, indicating a total donation of 375 pounds of pop tabs – that's two millions pop tabs!

Jeff and Krystal expressed a heartfelt thank you to the HCS community for their support before Elena was born, while she was undergoing care, and since her passing. They smiled when I mentioned that they have forever connected HCS with RMHC and the memory of Elena.

Lastly, they shared a photo of the Thanks-A-Million tree located at the RMHC Oak Lawn campus. Elena's leaf is located just above Jeff's shoulder. Jeff shared his desire to have an HCS leaf accompany Elena's leaf, and he hopes that the momentum that HCS has generated with pop tabs will continue!

PERFORMING BRAIN SURGERY....WITHOUT **BREAKING THE SKIN:** How Science of Reading Is Impacting Highland

Christian School

I recently participated in training through the State of Indiana Department of Education. During that training, the instructor shared that reading teachers are "performing brain surgery without breaking the skin." Teachers are changing their students' brains during their instructional time. In the last five years the phrase, "Science of Reading" has become a household name through podcasts and the news. It is not a program or product that you can buy. The science of reading is a collection of research over time that has been compiled. Teachers are using that research to direct their instruction, and it will continue to change as we learn more.

Teaching reading is based on five big pillars of instruction. The pillars are phonemic awareness (ability to play with sounds), phonics (lettersound relationships), fluency (reading accurately with the right speed and expression), vocabulary (knowing word meaning and how to use the word correctly), and comprehension (ability to understand what you are reading). One area of improvement we focused on this year in the primary grades is phonics instruction. Our teachers have always included phonics in their daily work, but research has shown that students need "explicit and systematic instruction." Students need to be taught the rules of the English

language through daily practice. Our Kindergarten through 2nd grade teachers implemented a program called UFLI. Our teachers have seen growth in their students' ability to read unknown words and use the spelling patterns in their writing.

The primary teachers continue to work hard to stay current with the research. They do so by participating in training through the department of education, adjusting their instruction based on the data we are tracking through benchmark testing, and meeting once a week to discuss the needs of their students. Tracking the growth of our students in the lower grades is so valuable. It helps us to identify who may need



an intervention, and achieve our goal of helping students before the gap widens as they get older and the content becomes much more challenging.

HCS teachers seek to provide consistent instruction for their students based on best practices; in hopes that their students will learn to love to read. A love of reading starts with a solid foundation in the skills we are teaching. "Reading should not be presented to children as a chore or duty. It should be offered to them as a precious gift." -Kate DiCamillo
